Competency evaluations for Chester Todd, confessed murderer of Sherri Majors, requested by both the prosecution and defense have been completed at Pueblo, and received by the court. However, at the last hearing, the defense requested yet another evaluation, a request that may or may not be approved by the court. The next hearing date has not yet been scheduled. Sherri Majors is the daughter of Linda and Everett Donelson.

The initial hearing for Eddie Holloway in the Sept., 2011 murder of Jason Gonzalez, 15 year old son of Dovalina Gonzalez and Juan Perez, was recently completed; and the next hearing is scheduled for Aug. 31 at the Arapahoe Justice Center.

But NOT Forgotten

Colorado, indeed our entire country, is once again in shock. One moment you're just going through the routine of another day, never in your wildest dreams expecting that in the next moment your life could be shattered. Oklahoma bombing, 9-11, Columbine, and now the Aurora theatre shootings (the largest mass shooting in America's history) to name a few tragedies. Shocking! Difficult to wrap your mind around such horrific evil.

We've been there, haven't we? Living our daily routine, and then one moment that call saying your child has been murdered. How to you wrap your mind and your heart around that one? Well, we know the feeling, the feeling of the families and friends of those killed and still in critical condition from this recent event. How did you react? Did it bring the memories back all too vividly of the horror of your sudden loss? Did deep sadness and compassion fill your heart? Did you want to reach out and hug every one of those families who lost someone in that theatre? Are you feeling the anguish of every person suffering in confused darkness and silence? I'm certain we all felt disbelief for sure and perhaps anger? I'll wager a myriad of emotions for those who lost a child by murder, emotions that bounced all over the place. Families lost fathers, mothers, children, siblings, friends, just suddenly gone! Who would guess it could all end in just a moment? Yet when death occurs on such a large scale as this, the entire country's' attention is focused on coming together as a community to make sense of the senseless.

I'd like to share a piece that was written after the 9-11 tragedy that not only applies to recent events, but also applies to the loss of our children. Just because our loss was not involved in a grand scale event doesn't make our loss any easier.

"Gazing upward, we saw plumes of fire and smoke staining the morning sky. Gazing upward again minutes later, another fireball in another tower. Then, before our disbelieving eyes, both mighty towers crashed to the earth, surrounding the city with acrid smoke and concrete dust and the sad silence of uncounted lives suddenly snuffed out. Gazing upward, our hearts were broken.

"Hate won the day. But it cannot win the war.

... "Hate cannot win against a city and a nation of people devoting their time and treasure, risking their safety, and donating their very blood to help the fallen and their families.

"Hate cannot win against a people discovering again what we have always known: the meaning of community, the bond of patriotism, the value of helping others.

"Hate cannot win against a society that stands tall when kneeling on bended knee.

"Hate cannot win against hope.

"Like the dust around us, so much is still unsettled. For awhile, the questions shouted from our souls may drown out the whispered answers that time and wisdom wait to tell. Yet, though our souls ache, there is hope. In our darkest hour, there is hope: carrying us, counting every tear, knowing us and aching to be known. For in all that mankind has ever chosen to worship, the God of the Bible stands alone as the only God who ever lost His own child.

We celebrate our children and we celebrate the lives of those lost in terrible acts of evil. There is always paralyzing numbness of days, weeks and months that follow. As Darrell Scott stated after the death of his daughter, Rachel, a Columbine student, he ... "knows the gut-wrenching pain that cannot find an adequate outlet even though your body grows sore from the fathomless, heaving sobs that never seem to end." But he also knows ... "the joy of celebrating a life that had purpose and meaning." ... "the miracle of slowly watching good and wonderful things emerge from the very pits of horror and despair. The transforming power of a loving God who can create the universe out of nothing, and can take the worst of tragedies and bring purpose, life and meaning from it."

With the loss of your child and the losses we see from these tragedies, we have the opportunity to make a choice to be bitter or better. Scott says, ..."those choices include honoring our departed loved ones and their memories. You are now a continuation of the lives of those you have lost. Make them proud."

God grieved over the hideous sin perpetrated on your child and on those of many innocent people. Evil choices frequently affect innocent lives. But remember, hate cannot win. Hate may have won the day but it cannot win the war. Love conquers. The human spirit in Love always wins. Love and Hope reign supreme. God Bless America


